Our young legatees again enjoyed a beach event with Legacy Australia, and many were able to take advantage of free tickets donated for different Fringe shows.

A JOURNEY OF SUPPORT

As we commemorate the 35th
Anniversary of SA Police Legacy
in 2024, it's a moment to reflect
on our journey, from humble
beginnings to a thriving organisation
dedicated to supporting our police
families. Founded in 1989, SA Police
Legacy emerged from a heartfelt
desire to provide assistance and care
in honour of those who have served
and sacrificed for our community.

For over a year, a Steering Committee toiled tirelessly, laying the foundation for what would become SA Police Legacy.

In October 1989, our organisation was officially born, with retired police officer Charlie Rumbelow rightfully assuming the role of President. The commitment of 720 police officers, who pledged regular payroll deductions, provided the initial fuel for our mission.

In the early 1990s, our first education grants were awarded, marking the beginning of our tangible support for police families. Starting with two parttime employees working from home, we steadily grew, establishing an office within the Police Association of South Australia (PASA) building and later acquiring a space on Carrington Street in 2011.

It is thanks to a generous bequest from police legatee Elvie Hearnes that this was possible and it put the organisation in a strong position for the future.

Over the following eleven years this growth culminated in our move to 286 Gilbert Street, Adelaide in 2022, offering a larger, more welcoming environment for our community and now boasting four employees.

Today, our impact speaks volumes. With annual grants exceeding \$130,000, we provide vital assistance to families in need.

We're grateful for the unwavering support of our sponsors, including Police Credit Union and Police Health, as well as the serving and retired police officers who contribute.

At the heart of SA Police Legacy is our board, comprised of individuals deeply passionate about our mission. Their long-standing dedication, many serving for over a decade, reflects our enduring commitment to our community. As we look back on our history with pride, we remain steadfast in our resolve to adapt and grow, ensuring we meet the evolving needs of our blue family.

Celebrating 35 years of SA Police Legacy, we're reminded of the profound impact of collective compassion and support. Together, we've built a legacy of care, resilience, and hope, and we look forward to continuing this journey, hand in hand with our community, for years to come.

CONTINUING BONDS

Have you ever heard the expression, 'death ends a life, not a relationship'?

In the past, it was thought healthy grief involved letting go of the person who had died. Some of the terms you might have heard are - moving on, letting go, acceptance, closure. People have been judged, criticised or encouraged to stop when they show behaviours that promote a continued attachment.

Since then, the thinking has changed and we have come to realise feeling connected to our loved ones who have passed is normal and can be a valid and healthy way to cope with their loss. We don't detach from them or leave them behind, we carry them with us; the relationship changing and developing throughout our lives, just as we do.

We also understand now that mourning doesn't always have an end (though it changes) and that's okay.

Of course, there are instances where continuing a bond with the deceased is not healing. Just as relationships with the living can be complicated, so can relationships with the dead and if the relationship was troubling prior to the death, it may remain so afterward. Sometimes the bond is continued, sometimes transformed into something new.

There are many ways we can stay connected to our loved ones who have passed.

- · Talk to them
- Write letters to the person are missing
- Keep photos of the person around
- Incorporate your loved one into events and special days
- Imagine what advice they would give you when making tough decisions
- Talk about them with new people, who never got to know your loved one
- Live your life in a way you know they would be proud of
- Finish a project they were working on
- Take a trip they always wanted to take
- Maintain their Facebook page
- Adopt a hobby they enjoyed
- Create a 'Dear Photograph'(dearphotograph.com)
- Plan for the anniversary
- Keep something that belonged to your loved one
- · Enjoy comfort foods
- Experience your loved one's presence

HEYSEN 75 FUNDRAISER

The inception of the Heysen 75 event (75 being the kilometres we covered within 24hrs) traces back to a personal aspiration that blossomed into a remarkable adventure.

I consider myself extremely fortunate to live and work on the beautiful Fleurieu Peninsula and after years of exploring the trails of Deep Creek Conservation Park and sections of the Heysen Trail, I was captivated by the idea of linking them all together for an epic journey from Cape Jervis to Victor Harbor. Little did I know that this simple idea would evolve into something far beyond what I had envisioned.

Fresh from my unforgettable expedition to Nepal and Everest Base Camp in November 2023, I found myself organising this trek and creating a small walking group of a few close colleagues.

Knowing how challenging the last year has been for SA Police Legacy, and how many times its services had been called

upon, we quickly decided to turn the trek into a fundraiser event to raise funds for the charity which has a profound impact on families when they need it most.

What began as a modest gathering of five enthusiasts swiftly blossomed into a spirited group of forty, united by a common goal to make a difference. The initial target of raising a humble \$500 soon surpassed all expectations, soaring to an extraordinary \$23,000!



THE LONGEST

In October 2019 I injured my back and right knee in a work incident which resulted in spinal surgery in 2020 and knee surgery in 2021.

The road to recovery from these injuries has been a long process involving physiotherapy, exercise physiology, chiropractic support and various medical examinations (all supported by SAPOL) At one stage I was even advised that I may need to consider another career.

Finding another career was something I have never previously considered and was a substantial blow on top of the adjustments I had already made to my lifestyle as well as the physical limitations that were in place. I started to feel depressed, anxious and insecure about my future which resulted in a lack of motivation.

Realising that I was not tracking well, I accessed psychological support and used my family and close friends as motivation - setting myself meaningful and measurable goals. I started exercising more frequently completing exercises set by my physio and exercise physiologist and eventually in 2022 was cleared for operational duties.

By exercising and being active my mind felt good and my chronic back pain dissipated, I gained sufficient fitness to travel to Nepal in 2023 and trek through the Himalayas (Mardi Himal trek). To continue to motivate me to keep fit I set the goal of completing a sponsored walk. Whilst walking from home in Golden Grove to work at Carrington Street (4 hours) I came up with the idea of a walk linking all four metro district headquarters.



Initially I didn't have a charity in mind but after the tragic deaths of colleagues last year I could not think of a more deserving charity than SA Police Legacy So, I set a personal fundraising goal of \$500 and started walking.

Setting off from Elizabeth Police Station at 4am, we arrived at Port Adelaide Police Station at 9:30am. Four more colleagues and friends joined and by 1pm we had made it to Grenfell Street. From here, we continued on to Christies Beach Police Station, arriving at 10pm - minus one. The entire walk took approximately 16 hours to complete, covering 73.56km and raising \$740 for SA Police Legacy.

MEET THE MEMBER

DETECTIVE SERGEANT MONIQUE VICKERY

How long have you been with SAPOL, what does your current position involve and what aspect of your job do you enjoy the most?

I joined SAPOL in 2007 graduating in 2008 (course 8). I was the mother of a one-year-old, turned 30 and got married while a Cadet... busy times.

I currently work as a Detective Sergeant in the Investigations Development Team at the Police Academy – a job that I absolutely love. My main role involves facilitation and instruction of the Investigation and Interviewing Techniques Course and the Detective Training Course which forms part of the Detective Development Program. My favourite part of the job is meeting new people and watching them learn, progress and find success in their accomplishments. I am also very fortunate to have an amazing team to work with – I often refer to my day as like working with a group of naughty brothers - they always keep me smiling.

What advice would you give to a police cadet in terms of the varying experiences they may encounter and how they can build and foster resilience?

Policing is the best job in the world, and I have reached a point where I wake up every day looking forward to new challenges. On a personal note, however, it has not always been an easy



road and at one stage in my career I walked away to protect my mental health. Through the support of my family, friends and colleagues I was able to return to policing with new insight and determination. You can't un-see, un-hear, or sometimes un-smell this job, however if something doesn't feel right there are some truly amazing people out there who really care about you and will always be there to listen. Talk, laugh, take time out. Share your trials and tribulations and you will be surprised how many share back. Let's support each other by checking in and acknowledging it's okay not to be okay.

What would be something that your colleagues would be surprised to know about you?

I am quite obsessed with Monster Trucks and I make my family go to the shows with me every year. My favourite is Buddy (he's such a good boy). I'm also really good at quiz nights, but not at answering the questions. I may be a little bit (ahem) competitive with the costume/table themes and have been known to ship specific costumes in from the US. I also have very high expectations of those at

our table which I'm sure drives everyone absolutely crazy and I will plan months in advance of events.

How long have you been a member of SA Police Legacy and why do you think it's important to contribute?

I joined SA Police Legacy as a Cadet in 2007. In all honesty I didn't really know what, if anything, the benefits would be when I was starting out. Nearly 17 years later and I have seen the huge difference SA Police Legacy has made to my police family. I have lost friends in this job to illness and suicide, all with partners and young families who have had to navigate not only the personal loss of their loved one, but also sudden changes to lifestyle, finances and future plans. Each of them has been supported by SA Police Legacy from special activities for the children, to education and financial assistance. I am proud to know that my small contribution has made someone else's life a little easier during incredible adversity. I take heart in knowing that if something happened to me, my family would be extended the same support.

MEET THE LEGATEE ANNE

Could you tell us about your family and how you came to be involved with SA Police Legacy?

I have four children and my youngest was just 21 when my husband, Tony passed away in 2009. Tony regularly donated to SA Police Legacy through his pay, never thinking we would one

day need the support, though we saw other police families receiving help. I never thought I would find myself a widow at 57.

Since then, I have found a new beginning with my husband Mark and together we share 14 grandchildren.

Mark's first wife also passed away, so we share an understanding and compassion for what we have both been through in our lives.

How has SA Police Legacy been able to help you?

I have been to many social events and really enjoyed dinners at the Police Club. The legatees know what it is like to be married to a policeman and they were like a family outside of my own family - someone to talk to without having to worry about upsetting anyone. I think it is a positive thing that SA Police Legacy brought on

Once I reached secondary school, the financial support of SA Police Legacy enabled me to play sports such as lacrosse, dance, and surf lifesaving. More recently SA Police Legacy has afforded me the opportunity to study music at university.

Tell us about your uni studies and what you hope to do when you finish your degree.

I am currently in my first year at the Elder Conservatorium of Music in the Jazz Performance course, where I study saxophone but also play flute and clarinet. In June, I also starting tutoring year 7 and 8 school students in saxophone. I would like to continue to combine practising as a musician and becoming a teacher, perhaps one day working as a music coordinator at secondary level.

What are your favourite sports/ hobbies/activities and what do you love most about them?

Currently all of my efforts are going into music (many hours of practice), but I also like to be outdoors, and enjoy kayaking and camping.




What is your favourite thing to do with your Mum?

SA Police Legacy president Jodi-Lee Black is delighted to welcome this partnership. "It is great to be partnered with another organisation who is so involved with


the South Australian community and who obviously cares about the policing community. With the increasing number of police families needing the financial,

Volunteering increases social interaction and helps build a support system based on common interests- it's also one of the best ways to make new friends and strengthen existing relationships. In many cases, volunteers have diverse backgrounds, which helps expand their social network and allows them to practice social skills with others. Whether volunteering to explore different careers, sharpen skills, stay active during retirement, meet new people and or serving their communities, all volunteers share a common desire to improve the health and welfare of people in their communities.


